Descendants of William Harrison, First Harrison?

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INTRODUCTION

My research is mainly from the records of the State Library of Virginia in Richmond, and includes a number of pieces of information provided by Lindsay Britton, who is a direct descendant of this family. I have yet to find the "smoking gun" that definitely ties me to the Prince George Harrisons.

My John Harrison was born ca. 1760 in Virginia, moved into Brunswick County, Virginia, around 1781, and lived in the area where Paul Hartwell and Mary Harrison Hartwell resided. (Mary Harrison Hartwell is a direct descendant of the earliest William Harrison). Paul Hartwell transferred land to John Harrison and participated in several deeds - - this land may be part of the estate of Mary's father Richard Harrison.

Paul Hartwell's sons, Harrison Hartwell and Armistead Hartwell, witnessed the marriage of John Harrison and Dorothy Rawlings Hancock. The circumstantial evidence indicates that there is a connection but what connection is still a mystery.

I believe that John Harrison may descend from the James Harrison side of the family.

Inasmuch as this is a significant Harrison family of Southern Virginia, I believe that the information I have gathered should be exposed for review, study, criticism, evaluation, correction, if need be. 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First Generation

1. William Harrison, First Harrison?, son of Unknown and Unknown, died before 1681.

General Notes: Early Virginia Immigrants:

William Harrison 1638, imported by Richard Bennett, Isle of Wight Co;

William Harrison 1656, imported by George Abbott, Nansemond Co.;

Between the years of 1658 and 1713, four generations of men named William Harrison lived in Charles City County and then Prince George County. During the years 1667-1673, abstracts of surviving records mention a William Harrison Senior and a William Harrison Junior. After 1673, there are records for the same Harrisons but the designations senior and junior have disappeared.

The first William Harrison probably died after 1673 and before 1681. He is identified as the father of Elizabeth Harrison and is presumed to have been the father of the brothers William and James Harrison. In 1662, in Charles City County, William Harrison was taxed for one tithable which means that in 1662, William had no son who had reached the age of 16. In 1667, William Harrison, Jr. was granted a land patent, which is taken to mean that he was then 21 years old, or close to it. If William

Harrison Jr. was a son of William Harrison, Sr. it seems that the younger man must have been born in 1646 or 1647

1665: Charles City County Court, 3 August: From Robert Jones to Mr. Pryse requesting that deed of gift be recorded, he giving Elizabeth Harrison, daughter of William Harrison "My God Daughter" a heifer. Signed Robert Jones, Wit: William Harrison Junior, John Ludwell.

William married (name unknown).

Children from this marriage were:

+ 2 M i. William Harrison Senior was born about 1646 and died in 1712 in Prince George County, Va., about age 66.

William married **Rebecca Unknown** on an unknown date in Virginia.

+ 3 M ii. <u>James Harrison</u> was born about 1647 in Virginia and died after 1712 in Prince George County, Va., after age 65.

James married (name unknown).

General Notes:

This compilation of material owes a great deal to those Harrison family researchers, Lindsay Britton in particular, who have shared their efforts to define the generations of this particular Harrison Clan. This then is a collection encompassing fact, documentation, primary records, and family tradition which seeks to preserve the history of this extraordinary family. (Patrick M. Harrison)

THE HARRISON NAME

According to some sources, the name Harrison is of Danish extraction (Aryson), which is indicated by the use of the syllable "son" as an ending for the name. This was a custom of the Danes and names ending in "son" have been in constant use in England ever since the Danish invasion. "Of all the ancient families of the Colony of Virginia that of Harrison, if not the oldest, is one of the oldest. The name has been distinguished for patriotism, intelligence and moral worth of those who have borne it." The traditional homes in England for the Harrisons are Oxford, Northampton, Warwickshire and Worcestershire. In 1972, there were 111,950 adult Harrisons in the United States - the 200 most numerous name. Referencing other sources under Harrison Family, we find that Harrison can mean "Hunter of Hares."

The Harrison name is also found in Scotland. Harrison means son of Harry (from Henry through the intermediate form Hanry). We know that Sir Laurence Harryson or Herryson, a native of Scotland, had letters of denization in England 1497 (Bain,IV, 1623, 1629). James Harryson, Scottish man, was author of An Exhortation to the Scottes to conforme themselfes to the honorable, expedient, & godly Vnion betweene the two realmes of Englande & Scotland, published in London, 1547. Magnus Harison in Gillisbrfek, parish of Lunnasting, 1613 (Shetland). Those from Fife would be a "Sept" (component branch family) of Clan MacDuff.

The Scotch records show that in the 1600 an Anglican English family settled in Bush Mills, Dunluth Parish, County Antrim. Later, the records show that 6 Harrison families came to early America from Ireland as "Scotch-Irish" - four from County Antrim 1 in 1744 settled o' the East Fork of Cook's Creek, Augusta Co., Virginia; 1 in 1775 settled in Guilford Co., North Carolina; 1 in 1800 in Georges, Fayette Co., Pennsylvania; 1 in 1871 at the Mission Road Church, Johnson Co., Ks. One Harrison Family or individual from County Down in 1778 settled in Hogan's Creek, Caswell Co., N.C. 1 from County Armagh in 1811 settled on the Permision River, New Madrid Co., Missouri. All of these settlers were Protestants.

Harrison is also found in Ireland, especially in Dublin and Counties Antrim and Down in Ulster. Most are incomers from England in the 1600s, or from Scotland. The name is particularly concentrated near Donaghcloney, Dromore Parish, County Down and they would be Protestants. Some Gaelic Irish named "Harrihy," "(O)(Mac)Henry" or "Horohoe" have changed their names to "Harrison," and they would be Catholic. Some of these Gaelic Irish families trace their legendary genealogies back through the kings and heroes to the Milesian invaders from Spain (1000-800 BC) who fought for the island with magical Tuatha De Danaan and the firbolg (the Picts), and who before that were in Scythia, Greece and Egypt.

Supposedly, this William Harrison Senior was one of the first two Burgesses elected when Prince George was formed in 1702

DISCLAIMER: Entries for the years 1658-1686 in the chronology offered below came largely from the work of Beverly Fleet, with a few additions marked Nugent and Hopkins. Entries for the period 1688-1713, came from the work of Dr. Weisiger, except an entry marked Nugent (James E. Harrison booklet, Sources: Ayres, Fleet, Haun, Hopkins, Nugent, Weisiger).

There is no attempt to attach each of these entries to William Harrison Senior or to his father. The entries are presented merely to provide information on those citizens named William Harrison who occupied this area during this period. It is difficult, if not almost impossible, to know whether there was another William Harrison in this area who cannot be clearly identified! (PMH)

1658: In Charles City County, Wm. Harrison was ordered to pay a cow to Wm. Wheeler according to bargain.

1660: In Charles City County, William Harrison by testimony produced in court proved his right to 550 acres for importation of eleven persons.

1661: Patent to William Harrison for 900 acres of land in Charles City County on the south side of James River upon the head of Florida Hundred Creek (Nugent)

In Charles City County, Wm. Harrison was sworn Constable for Flower de Hundred Precinct. In Charles City County, Wm. Justice of Weyanoke sold to William Harrison of fflourd hundred, land on the western side of the southern branch of fflour da hundred creek. The conveyance was witnessed by Thomas Crewe and Robert Exanes.

1662: In Charles City County, Will Harrison was taxed for 1 tithable.

1664: In Charles City County, Mr. Stephen Hamelin, Mr. Willm Harrison and Mr. Robert Evans were sworn Churchwardens for Weyanoke Parish.

1665: In Charles City County, a deed of gift was recorded from Robert Jones to his goddaughter Elizabeth Harrison, daughter of William Harrison. The deed was witnessed by William Harrison, Jun'r.

1667: Patent to Wm. Harrison, Junr. for 368 acres of land in Charles City County on the south side of James River beginning in the line of Capt. David People, to Robert Jones, down the Pyny Swamp to the Old Towne Bridge, to James Jones, to line of Mr. Richard Tye & C. (Nugent)

1669: Patent to Mr. Wm. Harrison for 300 acres of land in Charles City County, part hereof granted to John Freeme and found to escheat and formerly granted to Tho. Calloway & Co. (Nugent)

1673: In Charles City County, the petition of Wm. Harrison sen'r to be released from security for orphans estates in the hands of Jno. Ludwell was referred to next court, where Ludwell was ordered to bring security.

In Charles City County judgment to Wm. Harrison Jr. against Jno. Stith attorney of Capt. Jno. Rudds for 171 lb tobo for 10 pair oars.

In Charles City County, judgment to Wm. Harrison against Adam Tapley, and judgment to Adam Tapley against Wm. Harrison Junr.

1681: In Charles City County Wm. Harrison attorney for Rice Pritchett confessed judgment to Capt. Wm. Randolph attorney for Euseb. King.

1685: In Charles City County judgment to Wm. Harrison against estate of Robt. Wyatt for 400 lb. tobo for one pair of mens French fall shoes.

1686: In Surry County William Cockerham of Lyons Creek Parish conveyed to Robert Caufield, Gent. of the same parish 250 acres adjoining William Harrison, said Caufield, Blansford Creek and land of David Williams, dec'd (Hopkins)

1688: In Charles City County Owen Row proved his claim of taking up an Indian slave to Wm. Harrison above 20 miles from home.

In Charles City County Mr. Wm. Harrison and Wm. Archer to audit acct. between Mr. Jno. Everitt and Robert Shorte.

In Charles City County Wm. Harrison and Hen. Harman to value estate of Mr. Robert Netherland In Charles City County Judgment granted Wm. Harrison against Wm. Mastin for 360 lbs tobo from Rich Pritchett which deft. promised to pay.

In Charles City County those persons Wm. Harrison has presented for not bringing their lists to be summoned to next court.

In Charles City County, judgment to Wm. Harrison against Wm. Wilkins non suit granted to Wilkins.

1689: In Charles City County, Wm. Harrison was jury foreman in Cha. Bartholomew against Jno. Cogan.

In Charles City County, Wm. Harrison was jury foreman in Michael Mackey against Nicho. Kellsey. In Charles City County, the will of Jno. Smith was proved by Wm. Harrison, Jno. Lanier and Hilday Chappell.

In Charles City County, a certificate was granted to Wm. Harrison for 150 acres of land for importation of three persons. Harrison assigned his rights to Mr. James Minge.

1690: Patent to Adam Tapley and William Harrison for 1068 acres of land in Jordan's parish on the south side of James River beginning at Maj. Poythres, near Aroccock Path and near Nich. Whitmore (Nugent)

In Charles City County, Wm.Harrison of this county is empowered by the clerk and allowed by the court to enter all actions and petitions and other process in law in this county, by reason the office days are certain at Westover, but no certainty for the inhabitants of the south side of the river to come over if tempestuous weather happens; therefore this is done to favor them.

In Charles City County Wm.Harrison was jury foreman in Matthew Hubbard against Mr. Edw. Braine

In Charles City county Wm. Harrison was security for Capt. Wm. Archer in appeal to the General Court.

In Charles City County a certificate was granted to Wm. Harrison for 150 acres of land for importation of three persons.

1691: In Charles City County Mr. Wm. Harrison and Capt. Wm. Archer offer themselves as security that Geo. Jeffreys will abide by the actions of his attorney Jno. Everitt in a case against Jno. Baxter

1692: In Charles City County Wm. Harrison and Robert Sly against Richd. Griffin and Eliz. his wife that Griffin give security for administration of the estate of Jacob Bayly, dec'd. Harryson and Sly were put in possession of the estate of Bayly.

William Harryson and John Jane enter themselves as security for Charles and William, sons of Charles Williams, dec'd, to whom administration is granted.

William Harrison as attorney for William Syms, executor of Anthony Haviland, dec'd brings action of debt against Thomas Milton.

John Harryson of Martins Brandon Parish and Capt. Wyatt are sureties in room of William Harrison and Robt. Sly for Richard Griffin and Elizabeth his wife, administratrix of Jacob Bayly, dec'd.

1693: In Charles City County, Wm. Harryson's petition granted for his cause to be deferred because of his present indisposition.

In Charles City County William Harryson as attorney for Capt. Thomas Busby defended against Timothy Redding.

In Charles City County, a deed of Adam Taply was acknowledge.

1694: IN Charles City County, William Harrison attorney for James Jones and Sarah his wife, executrix of James Mumford, dec'd awarded judgment against Capt. Charles Goodrich.

In Charles City County a deed of William Harrison to his brother James Harrison was recorded.

In Charles City County Wm. Harrison brought an action of trespass against William Wilkins.

Harrison claimed he stood lawfully seized of 800 acres of land in Weyanoke Parish, part of a patent for 1198 acres granted to John Freme. Harrison and Wilkins agreed to a settlement.

IN Charles City County William Harrison was jury foreman in a case against Charles Bartholomew for unlawful marriage.

In Charles City County William Harrison was jury foreman in Robert Napier against Charles Holdsworth.

In Charles City County William Harrison was jury foreman in Robert Harker against James Lawrence.

In Charles City County William Harrison was jury foreman in John Lymbrey against John Ailott.

In Charles City County William Harrison was attorney for Thomas Busby against Benjamin Harrison as attorney for Robert Hathorn.

In Charles City County, William Harrison and Bartholomew Fowler were attorneys for Joseph Beale against Andrew Anderson.

1695: In Charles City County, William Harrison as attorney for Capt. Nicholas Wyatt defended against John Good in an action of debt.

In Charles City County William Harrison against Thomas Busby was dismissed.

1711: In Prince George County William Harrison, Jr. witnessed a conveyance from John Wicket and wife to John Wilkins. William Harrison, Sr., was mentioned in the will of Thomas Anderson of

Prince George County. (In surviving records of Charles City and Prince George Counties, this is the first use of designations junior and senior for men named William Harrison since 1673.) In Prince George County William Harrison and Sarah Hobbs witnessed the will of John Hobbs, Sr. of Weyanoke Parish.

1712: In Prince George County, William Harrison, Sr. of Weyanoke Parish conveyed 150 acres of land in Weyanoke Parish to his son Thomas Harrison and 682 acres of land on Chippokes Creek in Martins Brandon Parish to his son Richard Harrison.

1712: Prince George County, Wills & Deeds 1712, recorded PGC Wills & Deeds, 1711-1713, pps. 201-208: WILL OF WILLIAM HARRISON, SENIOR of Weyanoke Parish, Prince George County.

---- In the name of God Amen, August ye 25th day, one thousand seven hundred & Twelve, I Wm Harrison Senr of the Prsh Way=noake in Prince George County being of sound & perfect sense & memory, praise bee givein to God for ye same doe make, constitute & ordaine & declare this my last will & testament in manner & form following,

first - - being sorry from ye bottom of my heart, for my sinns past most humbly desireing forgiveness for ye same, I give & comitt my soul to Almighty God, My Saviour & Redeemer in whome & by ye merritts of Jesus Christ I trust & assuredly belive to bee saved, & my body to ye earth, to be buryed in such decent manner, as my exrs hereafter named shall think meet, & for what worldly estate it hath pleased God to bestow upon mee, I dispose thereof as followeth

Imprs: I will that all my just debts bee puntually paid & sattisfyed

Item: I give & bequeath unto my loveing wife Rebeca Harrison ye plantacon I now live on, & all houses orcherds, & conveniences belonging to ye same for & dureing her natural life, & I doe give my sd wife liberty to get timber upon any part of my land, for building upon or repareing the sd plantacon & all other timber, fenceings, & fireings, as she shall have occasion of dureing her natural life.

& I doe give my sd wife the rents of all my lands that is now or shall by mee, bee hereafter leased out, for & dureing her natural life, & after her decease, the sd rents to goe to them to whome I hereafter doe give & bequeath the sd land.

Item: My will & meaning is that a lyne shall bee run, from ye mouth of ye littlee meadow west n. west a cross my land till it comes to a lyne of markt trees made sometime since by Thos. Busby or till it meets with my brother James his land, & all ye land I hold on the north side that lyne when runn, or that course from the mouth of the littlee meadow a cross my land as afforsd (but two acres) I give & bequeath my sonn William for & dureing his natural life & after my wifes decease, hee in the mean time to hve & enjoy the plantacon hee now lives upon, according to my former gift to him, & after ye decease of my loveing wife Rebecca, & my sd son William, I give & bequeath unto his son William & to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten, all the land hereby given his father for life.

And for default of lawfull heirs of grandson Williams body, I give & bequeath all ye land hereby given to my grandson William, to his next eldest brother, & ye heirs of his body lawfully begotten, & soe to all his next eldest brother, untill it shall come to them wch shall have lawfull heirs of their body to inherritt ye sd land, I doe hereby give & bequeath unto my sd son William tenn acres land on ye east side the southern run to begin at ye mouth of ye bottom next below my saw pitts, & to run up ye southern run, to ye bottom next below ye white oaks lately fallen by William Mathews, for its length & upp ye sd bottom for its breath; for & dureing his natural life & after his decease I give the sd tenn acres of land to his son William & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten & soe to ye heirs of their bodys that shall inheritt ye land given in these presents to my son William

And I doe give my son William & his sons, that shall enjoy ye plantacon I now live on by this my bequest a cart path from my plantacon to my usual landing at yn elecon crossing noe fence or tended grounds.

Item: my will & meaning is that all my land, I hold between the long meadow, & the lyne to bee runn from ye mouth of the littlee meadow, bee devided in three equal parts, & the first third part next the head of ye long meadow, I give to my daughter Sarah Hobbs & to ye heirs of her body lawfully begotten.

Item: I give & bequeath the next third part to my grandson Thos Harrison & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten & for default of lawfull heirs of his body, I give the sd third part to my grandson Benjamin & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten.

Item: I give & bequeath my three hundred acres land at black water to be equally devided between my three grandsons Henry, Benja & their brother Richard, & the heirs of their body lawfully begotten, & whereas the sd three hundred acres of land from ye first swamp much southerly to the brows of the second swamp in length my will & meaning is that my sd grandsons shall take their parts a cross ye sd land & my grandson Richard to have ye inward part next Black Water Swamp, * my granson Henry to have ye midle part, & my grandson Benja to have ye putward part & my will & meaning is that that if any of my three grandsons dye without lawfull issue the survivers if one soe dyes, & the surviveors if two soe dyes to have the whole

Item: I give to my daughter Hannah Harrison all my land between the bottom next below my saw pitts & the stooping tree bottom, meeting the head of ye bottom & ye southern run to ye creek, for & dureing her naturall life she not to barr any of my posterity from a cart path to my usual landing eigther as it is now or verry little eastward upon ye bitt or rich ground, & I doe give & bequeath to her the ffeather bedd shee lyes upon wth everything belonging to it, & my loom, & all that I have necessary for a weavers trade, & my desire is that my wife let her have her next years accomadacon out of my stock, & ye corne that is upon ye ground & I doe give her two breeding sows, & I give her child a yearling heiffer

Item: I give & bequeath unto my daughter Rebecca Woodley eleaven pounds tenn shills to bee paid in full at price current by my wife in her life time or at her decease.

Item: I give & bequeath unto my son Thos Harrison & to the heirs of his body lawfully begotten, two acres of land on ye west side the southern run to begin on ye lower side the Ileland, my upper hogg pens stands upon, & to run four chain in breath, & twenty chain up ye southern run for its length, & I doe give him & them as afforsd a cart road from thence across my land towards Mr. Hardymans Millne, at his my sd sonns elecon, soe it cross no ffence or tended grounds; & I doe give my sd son thos Harrison, & ye lawfull heirs of his body, all ye land I have between the southern run & fra Wilkins land, Wm Shorts, Wm. Pigeons land Mr. Sam Moodys land, Jno Averrys land & FFlowardehundred Creek except tenn acres before herein given my son William and I doe give & bequeath my sd son Thos the ffeather bedd & furniture hee usually lyes upon & an iron pott & pott hooks, & a pr andirons wch his mother pleases after her decease & two leather chaires & I doe give him my largest whipsaw & chaine, & my red lined coat & my rapier scabberd & belt, & boots, & all my books except my bible.

And if it shall please God my sd son Thos should dye leaveing noe lawfull issue, then I give & bequeath unto my son Williams son Richard & to ye lawfull heirs of his body, one hundred acres land beginning at ye upper long point upon Flowerdehundred Creeke & to ye run up to ye mouth of ye Cross Creek for its length & upp ye cross creek & downe ye Maine creek for its breath & for default of lawfull heirs of my grandson Richd body, I give & bequeath ye sd one hundred acres land to my grand son Henry Harrison & ye heirs of his body lawfully begotten.

Item: I give & bequeath unto my son Richards son Willm one hundred acres of land, & to ye lawfull heirs of his body, if my son Thos Dyes leaveing noe lawfull heirs of his body as afforsd, wch sd one hundred acres of land is to begin on fflowerdehundred Creek on ye land given my grandson Richard,

to run up ye land to ye cross creek-for its length, & up ye cross creek & downe ye main creek for its breath.

And for deafult of lawful heirs of my grandson Wms body I give the sd one hundred acres land to his brother Jno, & ye lawful heirs of his body, & for default of lawfull heirs of my grandson Jnos body, I give & bequeath ye sd one hundres acres land to his bror, Richd, & ye lwfull heirs of his body.

And if my sonn Thos dyes without lawfull heirs as afforsd then I give & bequeath all ye remaineing part of ye land herein given my son Thos, to be equally devided amongst all my son Williams sonns (born & to be borne) excepting those sonns of his that shall by this my will inheritt ye land I now live upon & ye hundred acres land given my grandson Richard on fflowerdehundred Creek, & I doe give all ye remaining part of ye sd land to those sons of his as afforsd & ye lawfull heirs of their bodys & in case of any of their decease without heirs as afforsd, then to bee equally devided amongst ye surviveros & their heirs as afforsd

Item: I give to my son Richd my old gunn my blew cloath coat ye whitsaw now in his possession & my second largest chaine, & two young breeding sows.

Item: I give & bequeath to my daughter Eliza Norwood a new rugg & blankett

Item: I give & bequeath my daughter Jean Moody a new rugg & blankett

Item: Provided he stays & remaines wth mee & my wife till he be (smudge) one & twenty years of age or till boath our decease, I give & bequeath unto my grandson Henry Harrison a young cow & calfe a fixt gunn, two young breeding sows, three barreles corne, two suits cloathes, a hatt, two shirts & a pr shoes & stockings either at our decese or when hee attains to ye age of twenty one years wch first hapens

Item: I give & bequeath ye remaining part of my estate to loveing wife Rebecca Harrison of what nature or quality soever it bee found after my debts & legacyes are justly paid

And lastly I doe nominate ordaine & appoint my loveing wife exx, & my son Thos exr of this my last will & testmt to see ye same duly executed, & I doe humbly request the favour of my lovg friend Mr. Edwd Goodrich to assist & advise my sd exrs, or eighther of them in ye due execucon of this my last will & testamt.

Item. I give my Colledge Land to my two sons RICHARD HARRISON and JOHN HARRISON together with the land whereon I now live at the marriage or death of my wife to them and their heirs forever.

Item. I give to my sons WILLIAM HARRISON, JOSIAH HARRISON and HENRY HARRISON, the land I have possessed them of in my life time to them and their heirs forever.

Item. I give my son RICHARD HARRISON one negro woman, Cloe, together with all her future increase to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my son WILLIAM HARRISON one negro man named Walter, to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my son JOSIAH HARRISON one negro man named Seth to him and his heirs forever. Item. I give to my son HENRY HARRISON one negro boy named Toney to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my daughter NANCY COTTON one negro girl named Sarah together with all her future increase to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give to my daughter REBECKAH HARRISON one negro girl named Clarissa together with all her future increase to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give to my grandson JAMES HARRISON, son of RICHARD HARRISON one negro boy named Harcles to him and his heirs forever.

Item. My will and desire is that my mill should be sold and the money arising from the sale thereof be equally divided between my five sons namely Richard, William, Josiah, Henry and John Harrison. Item. My will and desire is that in case my wife should prove to be with child at the time of my death and should have a living child that the four negroes left to her during her life or widdowhood should descend to such child but should she not bring a child then my will and desire is that S. four negroes before mentioned be equally divided between my sons Richard Harrison, William Harrison, Josiah Harrison, Henry Harrison, John Harrison and my daughters Mary Ogburn, Nancy Cotton, and Rebeckah Harrison together with all their future increase.

Item. Also my will and desire is that all the rest and residue of my estate not before mentioned be sold and after paying all my just debts the remainder of the money arising from the sale thereof be equally divided between my loving wife, my sons Richard Harrison, William Harrison, Josiah Harrison, Henry Harrison, John Harrison and my daughters Mary Ogburn, Nancy Cotton and Rebeckah Harrison.

Lastly, do constitute and appoint my sons Rich'd Harrison and William Harrison executors of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this fourth day of June one thousand seven hundres and ninety-five. signed and sealed and acknowledged (his signature) Wm Harrison (seal)

in presence of: Pleasant Hunnicutt, Alexander Belches?, Glaister Hunnicutt, Henry Gee.

Reference to "Colledge Land": In the Sussex County Land Tax Books for the year 1803, there is a alteration from Wm. & Mary College with the notation, "100 acres to Wm. Harrison, Senr. William Harrison, for the previous years, paid tax on 146 acres and this year paid tax on 246 acres. William Harrison Jr. paid tax on 100 acres.

1804: In the tax records for 1804, William Harrison Senr. disappears and Mary Harrison is shown paying tax on 146 acres. William Harrison Jr., is still paying tax on 100 acres and Henry Harrison appears, paying tax on 100 acres (is this the "Colledge Land"?)

1806: In the 1806 tax records, William Harrison, Jr. disappears, only Mary and Henry are shown.

1807: In the 1807 tax records, Mary and Henry are still paying tax and William Jr. appears, paying tax on only 18 acres.

1808: In the 1808 tax records, Mary is deceased and disappears, Henry is paying tax on 100 acres and William Jr. is paying tax on 18 acres. There also appears a notation for another William Harrison Jr. and he is paying tax on 100 acres and an additional 130 acres.

1810: In the 1810 tax records, Henry is paying tax on 100 acres and William Jr. is paying tax on 18 acres. The other notation now says William Harrison "Sr." instead of Jr. and he is paying tax on 100, 130 and 235 acres.

1811: In the 1811 tax records, Henry is now paying tax on 50 and 85-1/2 acres. William Jr. is paying

tax on the 18 acres and William Harrison has either a B.L. or R.L. after his name and is paying tax on 100, 130, 150 acres. This last William passed away ca. 1811 but I do not understand the notation after his name.

1812: In the 1812 tax records, Henry is paying tax on 50 and 85 acres. William Jr. is paying tax on 10 acres. Rebecca Harrison now appears (William's wife is named Rebecca) and she is paying taxes on 100, 130 and 150 acres.

1808, Will Book G, P. 126. Will of Mary Harrison.

I, Mary Harrison . . . County of Sussex . . . lend to my loving sister Elizabeth Potts, slaves . . . three nephews, Henry Parham, Nicholas Parham, Charles Parham 25 pounds each when they arrive at age 21. At death of Elizabeth, negroes go to Nephew Charles Potts. Saddle to Patsey Parsons . . . etc.

GEE FAMILY EXCURSUS: This is a history of the Gee Family as it relates to marriages into the Harrison and Mason Families: Charles Gee, ancestor of all the succeeding generations of the Gee family in Virginia, appears on the quitrent rolls of Prince George County in 1704. In 2001, Gary Williams, Clerk of Sussex County provided the following information regarding the house of Ishmael Harrison which still exists: In tracing the title to this property, which is right at the Prince George-Sussex line, I found the land was derived from Alexander Harrison's 620 acres on the 1787 Land Book. I presume that the house was built soon after Ishmael acquired it around 1786. Ishmael left the property to his daughter Susan M. Harrison under his 1843 will (W.B.O, p.8). Susan sold the house with 121.66 acres in 1848 to her brother, William T. Harrison (D.B.U, p. 400). It remained in the Harrison family until it was sold by foreclosure in 1860 (D.B.W, p. 68). Phyllis A. Joyner, the present owner, resides at 110 Reade Street, Apt. 2, New York, NY 10003.

1802: The next deed shows an additional sale of land to the College of William & Mary on a line of Alexander Beleky? Dec'd., Tom Lenson's? line to Pleasant Hunnicut, Wm. Harrison's line . Wit: John Potts, Lewis Birdsong, Lewis Parham.

1803: Prince George Surveyors Records, p. 89; Surveyed for William Wilkins, Jr., 257 acres on Stage Road and Walls Run, which he lately sold to Col. William Harrison and John Gary, bounded by Thomas Gary, Charles Eppes. I then divided 232 acres to Harrison, 25 to Gary.

1804: The will of William Harrison, Richard's son, which, as noted was filed in Sussex in 1804, recorded n Will Book F at page 411, notes additional grandchildren: the above William Harrison, who filed the suit, Richard Harrison, John Harrison, Josiah Harrison, Joseph Harrison, Henry Harrison, Rebecca Harrison, Mary Ogburn and Nancy Cotton.

1806: Sussex County Chancery Suit, 1806-1817. Harrison's Executor, etc. v. Harrison's Executor, et als. Bill of Complaint transcribed by Gary M. Williams, Clerk of the Circuit Court of Sussex County.

The crucial document in a chancery proceeding is the pleading, called the bill of complaint. This is the instrument which identified the heirs of a descendent and the nature of their kinship. The above named suit was filed in the old Sussex County Court in January, 1806 by William Harrison (who was the executor and son of William Harrison who died testate in Sussex County in 1804) and which suit was dismissed in the said court in Marcy, 1817. The bill in this suit is particularly significant in that it identifies the daughters of one Richard Harrison of Prince George County, who, although he left a will (dated 27 March, 1781, and probated 11 October, 1791) which is among the scant surviving pre-1865 records of that county, it is a will which named only his wife, Rebecca, and seven sons: William, Alexander, Shadrack, Theodorick, Charles, Ishmael and Peyton. The bill filed in this suit provides considerable genealogical data on his daughters and their descendants.

The essential pleading of William Harrison argued that Alexander Harrison, his father's brother and co-executor of the estate of his grandfather, had failed to administer that estate properly. The will, which left specific devisals of real estate to the testator's sons, called for a division of the residue, which included all of Richard Harrison's heirs-at-law.

There were six daughters of this Richard Harrison and three of them living in 1806: Ann Hobbs, Mary Hartwell, and Eliza Bailey, the last named of whom married Richard Bailey, according to the bill of complaint. The report of the master commissioner in chancery filed amont the papers of the suit identifies Nathaniel Hobbs as Ann's husband and Paul Hartwell as Mary's Husband. The three deceased daughters were Mason Avriss (who married John Avriss, according to the master commissioner's report), Joanna Gary and Eve Clark (who married John Clark, who died testate in Sussex County in or about 1778).

The bill identifies Mason Avriss' three children: William Avriss; Lucy, who married John Carsley; and Rebecca, who married William Duell. The record also shows that Joanna Gary had seven children: her sons, William Gary, Richard Gary, John Gary, Ben Gary and James Gary; and her two daughters, Nancy Underhill (who married Howell Underhill, according to a 1784 marriage record in Sussex) and Didyme Cotton.

Estate records in Sussex prove that Didyme Cotton (also spelled as "Diadamia") married Harris Cotton, who died intestate around 1796, and that she subsequently married Richard Cook in 1787. Her children are shown in the bill to have been Richard Cotton, Frederick Cotton and Betsy Cook (who married John Cook, according to Sussex marriage records, in 1802). Four children of Eve Clark are named: Thomas Clark, Richard Clark, Littleberry Clark and Betsy Hobbs (who, as Elizabeth Clark of Sussex in 1789, married Isham Hobbs.)

(DOCUMENT): To the worshipful court of Sussex County, sitting in Chancery - - Humbly complaining sheweth unto your worships, your orator William Harrison, executor of William Harrison, deceased, that Richard Harrison, formerly of Prince George County, father of your orator's testator, departed this life after having made his last will and testament, of which an attested copy is hereto annexed as part of this bill, in which after disposing of his lands, he directs that all the rest of his estate shall be equally divided amongst all his former and latter children, and whatsoever any of his children had received before from him is to return to his estate in order to an equal distribution; only with the reserve that his sons Ishmael and Charles were to have one thousand pounds each for their deficiency in the value of lands. These thousand pounds the testator evidently intended to be paper money liable now to the scale of depreciation, as his will is dated In March of the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one. Of this will the said Richard appointed your orator's testator and Alexander Harrison the executors, who both qualified as such. That at the sale of the said Richard's personal estate, many of the legatees purchased more than their proportions - - some of whose bonds your orator as the representative of his testator still holds. One of them, however, Theodoric, got possession of his bond under a promise to pay a debt due John P. Cocke of thirteen pounds, out of it - - and to account for the surplus of it. But he has never done the one or the other. Owing to the circumstances, the dispersed situation of the legatees and the death of some of them, your orator finds it impossible to settle his testator's executorial account of his transactions on the said (Richard Harr)ison's estate without the aid of this court. Your orator will further (state he) has cause to fear that the said Alexander Harrison mismanaged and (not invested) a part of his testator's assets. But he is advised that his testator (is) not answerable to legatees for the waste or misconduct of the said Alexander and therefore he is extremely solicitous that an account be taken of the acts and responsibility tof each executor. To the end therefore that the said Alexander Harrison, and that Theodorick, Ishmael, Shadrach, and Charles Harrison, brothers of your orator's testator, Ann Hobbs, Mary Hartwell and Richard Bailey and Eliza, his wife, which said Ann, Mary and Eliza are sisters of that testator, William Gary, Richard Gary, John Gary, Ben Gary and James Gary, sons of Joanna Gary, deceased, who was also a sister of that testator, Nancy Underhill, a daughter of the said Joanna, Richard Cotton, Frederic Cotton, John Cook and Betsy, his wife which said Richard, Frederic and Betsy are children of Didyme Cotton, afterwards Didyme Cook, deceased, who was also a daughter of said Joanna, Thomas Clarke, Richard Clark, Littleberry Clark and Betsy Hobbs, children of Eve Clark, another of that said testator's sisters now deceased, William Avriss, John Kearsley (Carsley) and Lucy, his wife, and William Duell and Rebecca, his wife, which said William, Luvy and Rebecca are children of Mason Avriss, deceased, another sister of that testator, may on their respective oaths full true and perfect answers make to the premises. That your worships may direct your commissioner to ascertain and report how far the said Alexander Harrison hath exclusively acted in the management of his testator's affairs and may decree that as far as he has acted exclusively therein, the estate of your orator's testator may be shielded from all responsibility; and that the same commissioner may take to state an account between the other defendants - - how much some of them are indebted to, and how much others of them are crditors of the said estate of Richard Harrison, deceased - - that the creditors among them may be decreed to look for compensation in the first place to the bonds of the debtors, whose bonds (or what may be found due thereon) your orator has ready to assign or distribute as to your worships may seem proper - - and may secondly look for compensation to the said Alexander Harrison so far as he may be found delinquent - - and may thirdly look to the

estate of your orator's testator only for any surplus that my afterwards remain unsatisfied - - and that your worships may grant to your orator such other and further relief in the premises as equity may dictate. May it please, etc. (George Keith) Taylor for complainant

Report #1817-52: Agreeably to a decree of the Worshipful Court of Sussex Co. bearing date the 9th day of September 1809 Ordering that your Commissioner should ascertain and report to your honourable body how far Alex Harrison one of the exors of Richard Harrison dec'd had exclusively acted in the settlement of the said estate & how far Wm. Harrison the other executor, exclusively acted in the said settlement, and to state an account between the other defendants (in the said decree mentioned) setting forth how much some of them are indebeted to and others of them are creditors of the estate of R. Harrison dec'd, etc. -- Your Commissioner has examined all the papers that has come come to his hands, possession, or knowledge touching the said estate & from the best documents that he had been able to procure it appears that Richard Harrison of Prince George Co., left a will at his death which was dated the 27th day of March, 1781, and the said will was admitted to proof at PG October Court 1781 & the said will after giving some specific legacies to his wife during her natural life & dividing his lands amongst his sons directed that all the rest of his property should be equally divided among his former & latter children (except L1000 each which was to be given to his sons Ishmael & Charles for their deficiency of lands) & it appears that his sons Wm & Alex the exors in the said will named proceeded to sell the personal estate of the said Richard Harrison on the 17th day of November 1781 on a credit of 12 mos which sale appears to have amounted of L687.8.1. And

further at that time or some other (for the paper showing it has not date) to make a division of part of the negroes belonging to the said estate, 12 of them xxx were valued at L895 which made the average sum to each legatee amount to L74.11.8 & upon the decison some were taken as is usual in divisioning of that sort. And the said Wm & Alex appearing to have proceeded to pay the debts due from the said estate from the time of the sale to the year 1792, the latter end of this year all the debts appear to have been paid (except a small one of three pounds 3/ to a witness in a suit which was paid in the year 1799) And on the 1st day of Jan 1793, the executor Wm had paid the sum of L693.1.5 1/4 & the executor Alex had paid the sum of L107.3.4 3/4 which said sums after allowing interest on the amount of sales from the 17th day of Nov 1782 the time it became due to the 1st day of Jan 1793 & Int on the payments made by the two exors to that day (agreeable to a stated account rendered) left a balance due the exors of L68.6.9 from the sales of the personal estate, etc. And on the 1st day of Jany 1792 there was a sale of six negroes belonging to the said estate who sold for L332.15.0 which became due the first day of Jan 1793 & after taking the balance due the exors therefore left a balance for distribution among the legatees of L264.8.3 which divided among the legatees made the sum of L22.0.8 1/2 due each of them. And upon a settlement of all accounts due to & from the estate to each of the parties in their division of negroes and the purchases made at the sale by some of them and money paid some of them at sundry times by the exors each acct both Dr and Cr stands between them as below stated to the 1st day of May 1810:

By which statement it appears that three of the distributees are owing the others of them the sum of L285.9.9 1/2 and it is stated to me that some of the distributees became purchasers of some of the negroes that were sold the 1st of Jan 1792 and due the 1st of Jan 1793 for which I have seen no accounts of any money that has been paid and have not made an account of it in the aforesaid statement. And perhaps it might have been considered as a payment of their legacies aforesaid but there is no proof thereof exhibited to me. It is stated to me that at the aforesaid sale Charles Harrison purchased Betty & child for L79.1.0, Alexander Harrison purchased Violet for L25 & old Will for L7 Nath Hobbs purchased Billy for L40.12.0 & Theodoric Harrison purchased Bob for L90.12.0 for which perhaps the bond became due which it is stated in the bill in Chancery, Theodorick got possession of from Alexander Harrison in consideration of paying a small debt due to John P. Cocke. This all the information your Commissioner has been able to collect respecting the settlement of the estate. In the examination of the papers exhibited your Commissioner has found a number of accounts which were among the papers of Richard Harrison dec'd against sundry people and were sworn to by the exors as found among his papers & still stand uncollected to the amount of (after being sealed by the seale of depreciation) L1140.3.5 1/2 but most of them appear to be of an old date that is from the date 1752 to 1781 the year in which Mr. Harrison died, and there is some papers exhibited among them shewing that some of them have been denied by the persons charged with them stating that they had paid Mr. Harrison in his lifetime the full amount. As to the legacies left in the will to Ishmael Harrison and Charles Harrison of L1,000 each to make up their deficiency in lands I find a receipt given by Richard Bailey who is stated to be the guardian of Ishmael for L1,000 current money to William & Alex Harrison exors of Richard Harrison dec'd dated the 7th day of Jan 1782 witnessed by Theodoric Harrison. And also one other receipt given by Alexander Harrison

guardian of Charles Harrison to Wm. Harrison one of the exors of Richard for L1,000 which is expressed to be the money left Charles by his father's will aforesaid and is dated the 1st day of Jan 1788 & witnessed by John H. ITEM I give to my daughter, REBECCA MANGUM, one Negro woman named Pender during her Life and at her death eldest sone, ZACHARIAH, to him and his heirs forever. ITEM I give to my sone, ARCHABAL COTTON, one Negro man named Will and seventy pounds gold or silver, one sow and pigs, six barrels of corn, 300 pounds of pork, one axe, one hoe, one pot, one frying pan, one paile, fore sheaps and one feather bed & furniture, all which I give to him and his heirs forever. ITEM I give to my sone, CARY COTTON, the Plantation whereon I now live, and all my lands that belong to the Tract, one Negro boy named Lewis, to him and his heirs forever. ITEM I give to my daughter, JINCY COOK (Cocke ?), one Negro gal named Lucy, during her life and at her death to her daughter, ELIZABETH COOK, to her and her heirs forever. ITEM I give to my sone, WEAVER COTTON, the lower part of the land on the Black Swamp, being the part where Taddey Jarrell formerly lived, also one Negro boy named Gabriel, one horse Bridle & Saddle, to him and his heirs forever.

ITEM My will & desire is that after my just debts and legaceys is paid, that all the remainder part of my Estate of what kind or denominations whatsoever, to be equally divided between my three sons, namely, ARCHEBAL, CAREY, and WEAVER COTTON, by two good honest men to be chosen for that purpose by my Executors.

ITEM LASTLY, I do constitute & appoint my loveing sons, CAREY & ARCHEBAL COTTON, my hole, and sole Executors of this my last Will & Testament, hereby revoking and annulling all other wills heretofore maid, & acknowledging this for my last Will & Testament.

That accordingly a deed of gift was executed conveying to your orator a negro woman Lucy and her child and her and their future increase. That this deed was [de]posited in the desk of the gentleman who wrote the will but has since been lost or misplaced so that our orator cannot exhibit it at this time before the court, but he will be able to prove the contents of it distinctly and clearly. Your orator here [esc]hews to the court, that he is a most unfortunate human being. That his natural infirmities are so great and deplorable as to cut him off from most of the enjoyments of life and to prevent him from procuring the means of livelihood by [his own] exertions. That this, his delicate and lamentable condition, melted the heart of his father with pity and tender

---- induced him to execute this deed of gift for [ben]efit of our orator. That your orator [fre]quently applied to William Harrison, exor ---- William Harrison of the said William Harrison [no]w deceased and demanded of him the said negro woman and her chidren, under the aforesaid deed of gift. But now so it is may it please the court, the said William Harrison exor --- as aforesaid who is prayed to be made a [defe]ndant to this bill of complaint has refus[ed] [to] deliver the aforesaid negroes to your orator on various frivolous pretenses. In tender --- whereof and in as much as your orator is remedie[d] the premises, save in a court of equity where fraud is enquired into, and lost deeds are carried --- effect, to the end therefore that your worships --- compell the said William Harrison to

answer the foregoing allegations fully and truly and more especially set forth and say whether the father of your orator did not direct the writer of this will to bequeath Lucy and her children or some negroes to your orator and whether that bequest was not omitted through mistake. --- further state, whether a deed of gift was not afterwards made for the said wom[an] Lucy and her children and their increase and whether that deed of gift has not since is lost or mislaid. That he --- that are the names of the children of said Lucy and if she has had --- . May it please the court to decree that aforesaid negroes be delivered to your orator and that the deed of gift which as been lost or misplaced may be reestablished. May it please the court the premises considered to grant to your orator such other and further refief as may be consistent with equity or justice [as the] case may require. May it please the court the premises --- to grant the commonwealth writ of supeona directed ------ Dec 18th 1810.

To the worshipful court of Sussex County in chancery sitting the answer of Rebecca Harrison executrix of William Harrison deceased who was executor of William Harrison deceased to the bill of complaint exhibited in this worshipful court by John Harrison against the said William Harrison executor of the said William Harrison deceased and served against her by seine facias. This respondent saving and reserving to herself every benefit of exception whatsoever to the said bill of complaint for answer thereto saith that William Harrison father of the complainant died in the County of Sussex on the ---- day of ---- in the year ----- having a last will and testament an attested copy of which is hereunto annexed and to which your worships are referred as a part of this answer. That it is totally immaterial whether directions were given or not to the writer of the said will to bequeath the negro woman Lucy and her children in the bill mentioned to the complainant because such bequest not appearing upon the face of the will cannot now be supplied by evidence. This resppondant from the best information she has been able to obtain feels authorized to deny the allegation in the complaint bill that a deed of gift was executed to the complainant by the said William Harrison, his father for the said negro woman Lucy and her children and her and their future increase and therefore requires of the said complainant full, ample and disinterested proof thereof. On the contrary, this respondant will here state to the court that the said negro woman Lucy and her children were sold at public sale by her deceased husband, the said William Harrison, executor of the said William Harrison, the complainants father under the residuary clause in his will, made a part of this answer that her said husband became the purchaser of the said negro woman Lucy and her youngest child named Nathan and that a certain Frederick Cotton became the purchaser of her children Al and Bob, sometimes called Robertson - that her said husband after the said sale was possessed of the said Lucy and Nathan fully or more than five years before the institution of this suit, claiming and holding them as his own absolute property and she is inexpressibly astonished at the unjust and unrightous claim which is [now --- up to them] by the complainant. This responsent will further state to the court in answer to that part of the bill relating to the increase of the said negro woman Lucy that the said Lucy since she was sold as above mentioned, Lucy had several children but that she has only two living (except those above ;mentioned) to wit, Stephen and Chloe. Having answered [-------] combination [----] this despondent prays to be hence dismissed with her facts in this behalf most unjustly compended (signed) Rebeca Harrison

Sussex County to wit Rebecca Harrison exr. of William Harrison deceased who was exr. of William Harrison deceased this day formally appeared before me Benjamin Wyche, Justice of the Peace, for the said County of Sussex and made oath that the foregoing answer as far as the same comes within her own knowledge is true and as far as it is derived from the knowledge of others, she believes it to be true. In obaience to the Commison hereto --- directive to us we have this day at the house of Shepherd Davis by consent of parties taken the deposition of John R. Mason of lawful age in a suit now depending in the county court of Sussex between John Harrison complainant and Rebecca Harrison executrix for William Harrison dec'd defendant who being duly sworn deposeth and saith: that eight

or ten years before the death of William Harrison senr. this deponent was [ask for] by said William Harrison senr. and was present when Pleasant Hunnicutt wrote his will in which he gave a negro woman Lucy and her future increase to his son John Harrison. Subsequent to which period this deponent states that the said William made another will in which there is no mention made of the above named negroes and this deponent further states that about the year eighteen hundred and one or two he was at the house of Pleasant Hunnicutt and was shown a paper (which was taken out of a drawer at said Hunnicutt's) by William Harrison Jr. who asked him what it was and that he replied if it had been signed by William Harrison Senr. and witnessed (which it was not) it would have been a deed of gift to his son John for the above named negro Lucy and her increase.

And this deponent further states that a short time before the sale of the estate of William Harrison senr., William Harrison Jr. came came to his house and shewed him a copy of the last will of Wm. Harrison Senr. in which the above named negroes were omitted and asked this deonent what he should do with them, who ---- to sell them ---- that the said William Harrison Junr. then told this deponent that he and the other legatees believing it to have been the intention of their father to give them to his brother John had agreed to let him have them. And this deponent further states that a day or two before the sale he was at the house where William Harrison Senr. died in the company of Henry Harrison one of the legatees, who said he was poor and would not give up his right in the said negroes in consequence of which the negroes were sold with the other property. This deponent further states that he was at the sale of the said negroes and bid for them, after which William Harrison Junr. who became the purchaser bid for them, when this deponent asked him if he wanted the negroes for himself, who replied that as the legatees had ---- to let John Harrison have them which he believed to have been the intention of his father, he was determined to buy them and let his brother John have the use of them during his life if he would settle, but that he did not wish that to prevent the sale of them in consequence of these expressions. This deponent bid no more otherwise he would have given more for them. Question by the plaintiff: Did William Harrison address these observations to you or did he speak them loudly and publicly. Answer, they were addressed to me and he spoke them in the common tone of voice. Question by the plaintiff: Did you understand when the negroes were cried out that they were for John Harrison. Answer, I did understand that William Harrison bought them for himself but that John Harrison should have them for his life time if he would settle. Jn. R. Mason

Harrison Senr. when the above negroes was exposed for sale by Wm. Harrison Jr. his exor. That the said exor before there was a bid, made for said Lucy & child, observed to the company that he hoped no person would bid for her & child as he was fully convinced his father intended her & increase for his unfortunate brother John Harrison & that he intended or wished to buy her for said John; in consequence of the above declaration this deponant believing ---- sold for less tha she woud have done if no such declarations had been made as there was not more than two or three bids for her.

Question by defendant. Did Wm. Harrison senr. ever read the will wrote by you or hear it read? Ans. I cannot say he ever did read it or hear it read, but as stated before perfectly know it was his intention to have willed the within named negroes to John Harrison & that said will was sealed and so remained until after the death of the testator.

Question by the defendant: Was the deed of gift signed and witnessed.

Ans. I cannot positively recall but as before stated, gave it as my opinion it was a good and lawful deed.

Question by the plaintiff: Did you understand when the negroes Lucy and child were cried out that they were for John Harrison

Ans. I did on John Harrisons paying the purchase but not intended as a gift from Wm. Harrison senr. to John Harrison

eighteen hundred and four and William Harrison became the purchaser of them and this deponent does not know of any demand being made for them of the said William Harrison by John Harrison at any time before the summer of eighteen hundred and ten about the month of July or August - and further this deponent saith not.

In obedience to the annexed commission to us directed from the county court of Sussex we have this day at the house of Shepherd Davis by consent of the parties taken the deposition of Littleberry Ivey of lawful age in a suit now depending in said court between John Harrison complainant and Rebecca Harrison executrix of William Harrison dec'd defendant who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that he lived at the house of Pleasant Hunnicutt in the years 1800 and 1801 that at some time while this deponent lived at said Hunnicutts he frequently saw in an open draw a paper purporting to be a deed of gift (for a negro woman named Lucy and two children) from William Harrison Senr to his son John Harrison that this deponent verily believes that the said deed of gift was in the hand writing of Glaister Hunnicutt but that the said deed of gift was never signed or witnessed as this deponent verily believes during the time of his living at the house of said Pleasant Hunnicutt. - This deponent further saith that he was at the sale of the estate of William Harrison Senr. that William Harrison the executor while the negro woman Lucy & child were at the highest bidder, observed that his father had neglected or omitted to give the said negroes to his brother John and that he wished to buy them for him but whether he intended to give them to his brother or whether John Harrison was to pay for them this deponent cannot say.

Question by the plaintiff: Did you understand when the negroes were cried out that they were for John Harrison.

Answer. I expected that William Harrison was trying to get them as low as he could and that John Harrison was to pay for them.

Question by the plaintiff: Do you believe they would have sold for more if William Harrison had not made those observations.

Answer. I believe they would have sold for more.

Question by the plaintiff: At what time did you go away from Pleasant Hunnicutts to live.

Answer. In answer in January 1802.

Question by the plaintiff. Do you know where the deed of gift was when you went away.

Answer. I believe it was in the draw where I had frequently seen it but I cannot charge my memory on what day I saw it last - further this deponant sayth not.

In obedience to the annexed commission to us directed, we have this day at the house of Shepherd Davis by consent of the parties taken the deposition of Henry Gee of lawful age in a suit depending in the county court of Sussex between John Harrison complainant and Rebecca Harrison executrix of William Harrison dec'd. defendant who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that some time in the latter part of the winter of 1799 or 1800, this deponent went to Petersburg. that in passing near Launcelot Stout's shop, he was called to by David Hobbs that he went up nearer the door and David Hobbs asked him when he would see his old brother Harrison meaning as this deponent believes William Harrison senr. of Sussex County. This deponent replied that he should see him tomorrow night. David Hobbs then said tell old cousin Billy to come and see me. Theo Harrison and the brethren threaten to sue me as his security for the administration or executorship of his father's estate. Tell him to come and see me. Accordingly this deponent returned to the house of William Harrison senr. the next night and delivered this message of David Hobbs to the said William Harrison senr. William Harrison sen. remained silent for some few moments then said "let the worst come to the worst I will do something for my son John for he is unable to earn his living."

Question by the same: Did you hear any observations made by the executor when the negro Lucy and her child were set up to the highest bidder and what were they.

Answer to the forgoing question. William Harrison Jr. the executor observed that these negroes were intended to be given by his father to his brother John but was omitted by the writer of the will and that he hoped as all the legatees had given up their rights, that no person would bid against him as he intended to buy them for his said brother John Harrison.

Question by the same: Do you believe that the negroes would have sold for more money if the above declaration had not been made.

Answer. I suppose they would but I thought myself they were about their worth.

Question by the same: When they were cried out did you ----- they were for John Harrison. Answer. I did.

Question by the defendant: Did you ever witness a deed of gift from William Harrison Senr. to his son John for the negroes Lucy and child.

Answer. I never did to the best of my recollections nor did I recollect ever to have seen or heard of such a deed.

Harrison, who died ca. 1835 had a son Collier who was perhaps born somewhere between 1825 and 1835 (Lindsey Britton). Both collier H. and Collier Harrison are listed in the personal property tax lists.

There is evidence to suggest that he was Shadrack's oldest son: 1) Personal property Tax records for Prince George indicate that he was living in the household of Shadrack Harrison in 1810, the year before he first appeared on the list (1811). 2) In 1803, he inherited the estate of David Hobbs (Prince George Land Tax). 3) Collier's son David left his estate to kinsman David A. Harrison, grandson of Alexander Harrison. 4) There is a family tradition that he was closely related.

Harrison did on the 26th day of April in the year 1838 in order to accord to Peter Eppes the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars with the accruing interest thereon executed to Daniel Epes a deed of trust on a certain tract of land in the County of Prince George containing 300 acres more or less which deed is duly recorded in the County Court of Prince George. And whereas the said Daniel Eppes, after duly advertising the same agreeably to the provisions of the ded aforesaid did expose the said land at public sale on the premises on the 23 day of January instant for so much costs as would be sufficient to discharge the debt interest and costs of sale . . . Wit: Ro. Gilliam H. Heath R. H. Batte.

Mildred, wife of James Harrison, relinquished her dower right. No witnesses. Recorded 14 Sept 1790,

1802: At the November Court of Prince George County, Collier was conveyed the tract of land whereon he lives by the will of David Hobbs (PGCo Land Tax List 1803 alterations) and David Hobbs estate of five tracts of land: 100 acres valued at 4/8, 48 1/2 acres valued at 4/8, 200 acres valued at 4/8, 100 acres valued at 3/11, and 116 1/2 acres valued at 4/8 (PGCo Land Tax list 1803). 1803 is the first year that Collier is taxed on any land.

1802: July 23, Prince George Co. Surveyor's Records, 1794-1824, p. 76; Surveyed for Wallace Morrison, land called "Darvils", 576 acres, later sold to Nathaniel Marks Jr., bounded by Lem'l Harrison, Hoods Road, James Bishop, Thomas Hobbs, David Hobbs and branch, adjoining James Harrison

1812: August Court, Account of guardianship of John James Thweatt with Collier H. Harrison, returned, Prince George Court orders, 1811-1814, p. 239

1814: Collier is taxed on 348 1/2 acres valued at 4/8 north of Wards Creek adjoining Alfriend Butts and others, 100 acres valued at 3/11, north of Wards Creek adjoining the original tract, and 116 1/2 acres valued at 4/8 north of Wards Creek adjoining the original tract. All tracts are located twelve miles to the east of Prince George Court House.

1824-26: the land tax lists show that Collier H. Harrison was a resident of Sussex County. He was taxed on two tracts of 462 1/2 acres and 100 acres, basically the amount he inherited from David Hobbs.

1827: Collier H. and wife conveyed by deed part of his land to T. P. (Thomas P.) cocke and S. M. (Shadrack M.) Harrison, leaving himself with one tract of 303 1/2 acres. Cocke got 40 acres and Shadrack got 219 acres.

1835: Collier H. conveyed by deed 46 acres to J. B. (James B.) cocke, leaving himself with 257 1/2 acres. There is no mention of Collier's wife.

1842: Last year Collier H. Harrison is listed in the land tax lists. His 257 1/2 acres do not show up as taxed to a Harrison in 1843.

1843: The personal property tax list shows "Harrison, David, Adm. Collier H. Harrison, 1 prob. .50

1845: David Harrison is taxed on 136 acres on Holly bush. The notation is "1843 from John Cole by deed and omitted in 1844 inadvertently". Whether this is Collier's son David is not known. This is the first year a David is listed.

Collier married Martha Andrews on 12 Jun 1822 in Sussex Co. Virginia.

In 1792, James W. Harrison is shown paying taxes on 100, 400, 307 acres. In 1795, in the alterations, there is a notation that James W. Harrison transferred to Capt William Harrison 100 acres. Yet, the next year 1796, James W. Harrison is shown paying taxes on 100, 400, 307, 100 acres. Perhaps there

is a mistake and Capt Harrison transferred the land to James W,, not the other way around.

Selden also had their names stitched on the sampler, they were evidently guardians for Dolly and lived at "Marthasville," which was only three miles from "Chester" (the Williams home). Martha Selden was one of the Allens of "Claremant" in Surry. The half-sister, Elizabeth B. Harrison, died in infancy.

According to Gary Williams, Dolly subsequently married in 1836 one William Basdam, who in 1860 married Parthenia J.A.E. Grantham Harris Bendall, who in 1858 divided slaves with Burwell C. Harrison pursuant to the will of one Joseph Heath (Harrison only having his slaves for life, an indication they were his only by right of his wife.) Parthenia married Joseph S. Harris in 1825 and Isaac J. Bendall in 1840 (Bendall died in 1852; he and Parthenia were the parents of Jane Gee Bendall, Henrietta James Bendall and the Fannie B. Bendall who received the bulk of Burwell Harrison's estate.

He had a railway from his saw mill to Fort Powhatan Wharf on the James River. The track crossed my father's farm. I walked the track to school. It was made entirely of lumber, rails and all. The engine was powered by steam from a wood-burning engine, the weight of the engine cracked the wooden ties and caused them to splinter. They were replaced often. The man who repaired the track was cross-eyed and was often tipsy. I was afraid of him so I went around him some distance as I walked to school.

Mr. Harrison was Mrs. Henrietta Britton's brother. Mr. Harrison's wife was Miss Eddie Tatum, sister of Agnew Tatum who married my great uncle John Baugh of Spring Grove, Surry Co., Va. I was taught to call her cousin Eddie, but she was no blood kin, only by marriage.

Mr. and Mrs. Harrison had a son David, his son or grandsons live in Hopewell. Mrs. Britton married Ruffin first, had two children Mary and Charlie, then 2 Britton children named James and John. I knew them when they were boys at Brandon Church. They pumped the old hand pumped organ while Mrs. Britton played for services. There is a beautiful window in the church in her memory.
